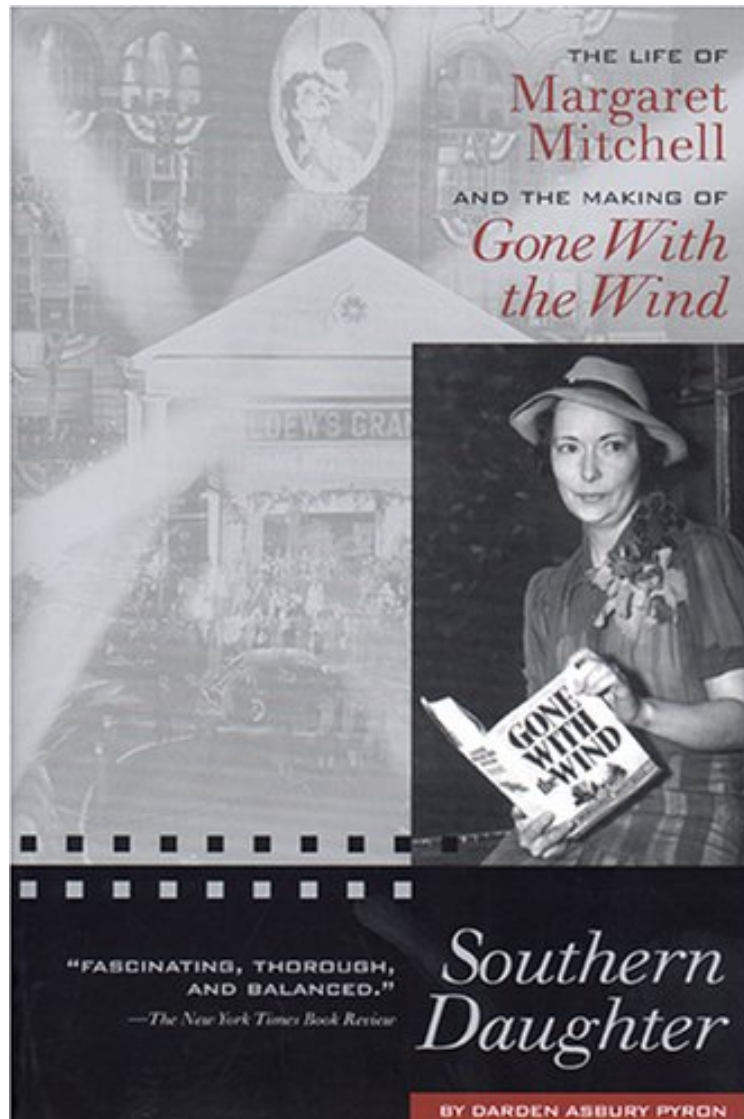

Mitchell is portrayed as a quick-witted and very personable character -- one that everyone would love to know. However, I felt the latter part of the book was pretty unflattering (although perhaps true) with regard to Mitchell's personality and the bitter and malicious picture it painted of her last few years. The author may at times be taking some liberties in his implication of understanding the inner workings of her mind. Another slight criticism of this book is the enormous amount of typos -- more than in any other book I've ever read! Overall, as someone who holds both the novel and film as her favorites, I would recommend it.
