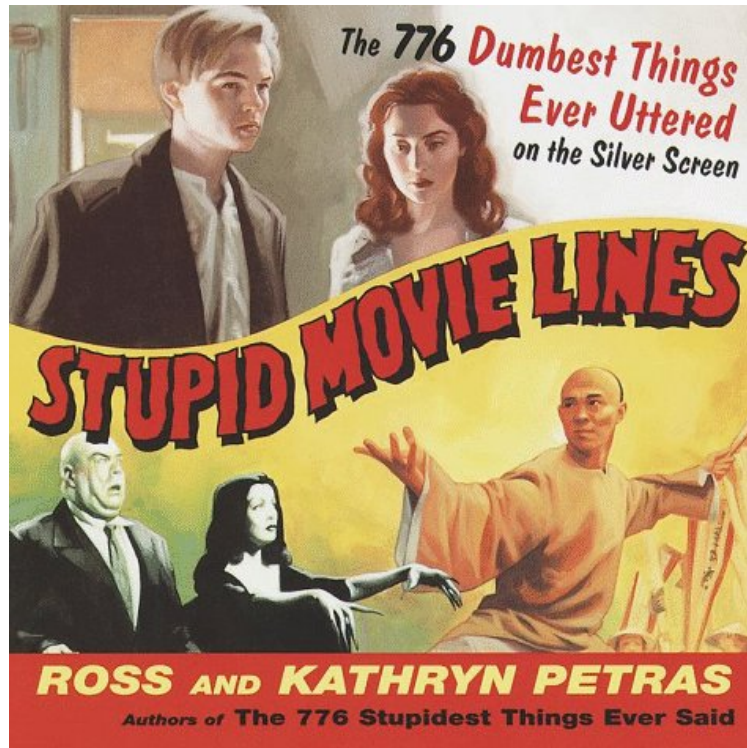

I am from Holland and since this book is in English sometimes jokes or lines that are funny due to their clumsy language and meaning take translation time to digest. I cannot say all 776 quotes made me laugh, since I am sure some are pulled out of context too. Those lines might have made perfectly sense when seeing the whole movie. But nevermind, for me after a while the book picked up pace and turned into great entertainment value - especially when it came to science fiction and horror movies of the 1950s and 1960s. I loved the way the quotes were introduced, something like for instance 'On what to say to a 50 feet killing rabbit from Mars', which was often just as funny as the (stupid) quote that followed. I did not know that mainly the 50s and 60s produced that many (legendary bad) science fiction and horror movies! Unlike many quote books, this one was well structured (although it did not matter to me since I read it in one go). You will find quotes simply from A-Z but also categories like 'bad lines from established actors' etc. There is even a whole chapter with a short resume on the legendary Edward J Wood Jr, who is now considered by many as the worst director of all time. It is both interesting and fun to read about this, since his eccentricity easily eclipses that

of the likes of Howard Hughes. So does this book live up to its title and is it worth the money (I bought it in Kindle format, the paperbacks are sometimes 1 cent!)?
